
ABOUTTHE COVER ARTIST

Steve has won several awards at local art shows including 1st place at Art Fiesta in late February 2021 and Best in Show at the annual Artists' Workshop awards on March 6, 2021.

Four times Steve was selected in the top 100 landscape artists "Arts for the Parks" national competition. He is a freelance artist for Hamilton Collection and Bradford Exchange that includes local scenes, historic, wildlife, portraiture and murals in all mediums.

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Have You Seen Me? Top 3 Plants Found on Florida's East Coast Dunes

Beach dunes offer a harsh environment, with blazing sun, salt spray and dry, blowing sand. But some plants do thrive, and these coastal wildflowers create a natural beauty found nowhere else. Here are three you are likely to see.

- **1. Indian Blanket Flower, (Gaillardia pulchella):** Colors of this showy native range from yellow to red to orange. It attracts many pollinators and makes a great addition to any landscape, not just our dunes. Although gaillardia is not long-lived, it renews itself by readily self-seeding.
- **2. Sea Oats, (Uniola paniculata):** This native plant is so important to our dunes' health that is protected by the state. Sea Oats relies on the sand blowing into its grassy blades to help hold it up. When running for your frisbee, make sure you don't disturb the Sea Oats.
- **3. Dune Sunflower, (Helianthus debilis):** A sprawling groundcover, Dune Sunflower (or Dune Daisy) is a cousin of our towering sunflowers. The tiny yellow petals and black center steal the show on the dunes. This beauty can be found from the shores of Florida all the way up to Maine.

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Mary S. Harrell Black Heritage Museum

The Mary S. Harrell Black Heritage Museum is the cornerstone of the Historic West Side Community in New Smyrna Beach, Florida. The museum resides in the old Sacred Heart/St. Rita church building, constructed in 1899.


The museum displays a rich and varied collection of photos, oral histories, and memorabilia that tell the story of the people who live here. The collection educates citizens and students about the history and race relations in small town Florida over the course of the twentieth century. The oral histories and photographs speaks of the hardships and triumphs of this African community from the early 1900's to the present. These personal accounts of daily life make history come alive for young and old.

Mary S. Harrell, founder of the museum, knew the value of preserving history. She once stated "Slavery and discrimination may be ugly, but the

stories of the past, both good and bad, need to be told. I want the children to know that was life then, and if you're not careful, you'll slip right back to it".

A LOST LANDMARK









Here is a local landmark that most never had the chance to see, The Ocean House.

The home was first built by Edmond Kirby Lowd and his wife Victoria Sheldon Lowd in 1868 as a boarding house. You may remember Victoria Sheldon, we had a theater in town named after her in the building that is now the home to Little Drug Co. The building still hosts her name near the top. The Lowd family eventually sold the boarding house to Francis W. "Capt. Frank" Sams and his wife Zelia Sheldon Sams who then added two wings to the boarding house eventually expanding it to 50 rooms.

The Ocean House became a winter hunting and fishing destination of choice and a focal point in the community. With an unspoiled view to the East, it was featured on post cards and photos of the local area for years.

Today the area between Canal Street and Julia Street along Riverside Drive is the approximate location of the old Ocean House.

If there was a location where the first people of real prominence in early New Smyrna seem to intersect, it would be the Ocean House. Names like Sheldon, Lowd, Sams, Faulkner, and Wilson are now the names of our streets and have their names and initials prominently displayed on historic local landmarks like our New Smyrna Museum of History. In his book "Images of America, New Smyrna Beach" Lawrence Sweett shares that "The hotel died the death of old buildings and new times and was torn down in 1946". Two statues that formerly stood at the entrance to the sidewalk that led up to the Ocean House, the fox and cat, were said to have been crafted in France in the late 1800's, and gifted to Sams. Frank Sams son Murray Sams, who had inherited the Ocean House, later gave the statues to Rollins College in 1934 where they took on a life of their own. The President of Rollins College at the time, Hamilton Holt, who was inspired by the statues formed a "Cat Society" for women and a "Fox Society" for men. According to the Rollins Archives, these societies were exclusive groups made up of four women and four men each, elected by an annual vote of the student body. The women elected the foxes; the men elected the cats. These privileged members were the only people permitted to touch the statues. But occasionally, the fox and cat were taken and hidden as practical jokes. The year 1949 was tragic because the cat statue

was smashed beyond repair. To this day, the crime remains unsolved. The fox statue remains a historic icon of Fox Day at Rollins College. Images are courtesy of The Sweett Family Collection, and The New Smyrna Museum of History's Sheldon Research Library.

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New Smyrna Museum of History

Located at 120 Sams Avenue, in the Canal Street Historic District. Exhibits include The Turnbull Settlement Display telling the story of Smyrnea', a British Colonial settlement of the late 1700's which marks the beginning of New Smyrna Beach, the third oldest settled community in Florida. A local area timeline shares objects, photos and maps in a transitioning exhibit outlining the development of the local area from Native American times, through the Vietnam era. An exhibit showcasing local area surfing culture brings you into modern times. A gift shop featuring unique local gift items and literature on local history is also available.

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The New Smyrna Odyssey Memorial

Located in Riverside Park, the Odyssey Memorial stands twenty-four feet high and was designed by the Xepapas Design Group, led by the late architect Andy Xepapas of the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association (AHEPA) that commemorated the arrival of the early settlers to New Smyrna from Greece, Minorca, Italy and Corsica. The project was completed in the early 2000's with the painting done by the Apostolos Group and Weston Coatings. They also re-painted the memorial in the summer of 2019.



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
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Area Map of New Smyrna Beach



New Smyrna Beach's Historic

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
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- Always swim directly in front of a lifeguard.
- Alcohol and glass containers are not allowed.
- Pets are not allowed on the beach except service animals required due to a disability, as governed by the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- Music or noise that can be heard from more than 50 feet of the source is illegal.
- It is illegal to disturb dune vegetation.
- Personal watercraft operators must stay in the proper zones and wear a helmet at all times.
- Grill on the beach is permitted. If using charcoal to grill, beachgoers must take the charcoal with them and properly dispose of it off of the beach. Charcoal cannot be disposed in the beach trash/recycle containers and it may not be put in the sand.
- Do not disturb a turtle that is crawling to or from the ocean or laying eggs. Watch from a distance.
- Avoid shining lights on the beach at night as this may frighten away nesting females and interfere with the baby turtles' ability to find the sea.
- Avoid walking or cycling in places posted as nesting areas.
- Immediately report any injured or dead sea turtle to the nearest Volusia County Beach Safety employee.
- Do not disturb markers or protective screening over turtle nests. These nests are being studied and protected.
- Avoid walking on the dunes along the beach.
- Do not disturb nesting sea birds
- Do not litter. Cigarette butts, fishing line and other trash can harm the animals and birds along the beach.
- Do your part to spread the word about environment-friendly habits on the beach.

10 Fun Facts About New Smyrna Beach!

- NSB was the largest attempt of British colonization in the New World. It is known as the second oldest city in Florida and celebrated its 250th birthday in 2018.
- Our excellent surfing conditions have produced more than 8 world-class competitive surfers over the years.
- NSB has the most biologically diverse estuary in North America. It is home to more than 400 species of birds, dolphins, manatees, alligators, turtles, and more.
- There are no chain restaurants on the beachside. Everything is locally owned with only mom-and-pop style restaurants.
- NSB is the "Redfish Capital of the World." Anglers can participate in world-class fishing offshore and in the backwaters of Mosquito Lagoon.

- 6 NSB is one of three locations in Florida where beach driving is allowed. But there are traffic-free zones as well!
- Ponce de Leon Inlet is home to the Ponce de Leon Inlet Lighthouse, which is the tallest lighthouse in Florida and the second tallest masonry lighthouse in the country.
- New Smyrna Beach is set on a barrier island. There is no access to A1A North or South out of New Smyrna Beach.
- Winter, the dolphin known for its prosthetic tail and star of the Hollywood film, Dolphin Tale, was actually found and rescued in the Canaveral National Seashore in NSB.
- NSB is a great location to spot rocket launches at the Kennedy Space Center. Drive down to the southernmost point of the Canaveral National Seashore for an up-close view of the launches.



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
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MARINE LIFE

Volusia County's world famous beaches attract millions of visitors each year. The sparkling, white sands of New Smyrna Beach offer a variety of environmentally friendly recreational experiences.

The beaches also are home to hundreds of fascinating plant and animal species. Some animals, such as the loggerhead sea turtle and the piping plover, are threatened with extinction. As a result, they are protected by state and federal laws. To preserve this beautiful natural resource for future generations of beachgoers, all of us must work together to care for and protect this fragile beach ecosystem. From May 1 through Oct. 31, Volusia beaches host an unusual marine visitor -- the sea turtle. These magnificent animals emerge from the surf at night to lay their eggs in nests dug into the dry sand, then return to the sea. Two months

later, about a hundred baby turtles or hatchlings emerge from each of these nests and crawl to the ocean. This amazing cycle of Mother Nature is thousands of years old.

Volusia County has taken several steps to protect these gentle creatures. Beach driving and parking is regulated. Vehicles are not allowed west (landward) of the dune conservation zone where sea turtle nests are most common. Night driving and lighting from beach front properties is restricted because the mother turtles and tiny hatchlings are confused by bright lights. 

Canaveral National Seashore

Canaveral National Seashore contains nearly 58,000 acres of barrier island, open lagoon, coastal hammock, pine flatwoods, and offshore waters. With 24 miles of pristine beach, it is prime habitat for many threatened and endangered species providing nesting beaches for several thousand protected marine turtles. Two thirds of the park is within Mosquito Lagoon. The lagoon is designated an estuary of national significance and an outstanding Florida water-way. It is one of the most diverse and productive estuaries in North America. The national seashore also contains cultural resources that reflect human history in the Florida peninsula from 2000 BC to early 20th century Florida settlement. Swimming, sunning, surfing and beachcombing are favorite pastimes on this strip of land that time as left untouched.

You may gain entrance to Canaveral National Seashore from south New Smyrna Beach, Apollo beach district or east of Titusville, Playalinda beach district. There are many entry point on the lagoon section of the seashore. For current operating hours and fees see www.nps.gov/cana

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

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U.S. COAST GUARD PONCE INLET STATION

Nestled on government property at the end of Peninsula Avenue, Ponce Inlet, is the U.S. Coast Guard station. Operations began in 1938 at the present site with most of the structures from that era still in use daily. The newer building by the entrance has ten living quarter units upstairs while downstairs is the mess hall, recreation room and TV lounge.

The New Smyrna Coast Guard station is one of nine on Florida's east coast between Mayport in Jacksonville to Key West. Its prime mission is search and rescue, along with the awareness of boating safety to all those who use area waters. The station does get an assist from volunteers on that accord who are in the Coast Guard Auxiliary.

While some 31 guardsmen are assigned to the Ponce Inlet station, an additional 15 coast guard reservists put in time usually on the first and second weekend of each month, they also go on active duty two weeks each summer. In addition, the station is headquarters for a U.S. Marine Fisheries agent who's task in this area is to study marine life.

To assist in the tasks of a dangerous inlet, a new specially built 48 foot search & rescue vessel was delivered in 2001. State of the art, this craft can take seas up to 30 feet and if capsized, will right itself. It's state of the art in every way, from computers to 4 steering stations, three electronics and one hydraulic.

Smaller boats from 17' to 24' are also based at the Ponce Inlet station which also serves the St. Johns River and Lake George in west Volusia County.



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Breakfast Spots -

Whether you want a hearty meal of bacon and eggs or something more inventive like chai banana bread French toast, there's a bounty of breakfast options in New Smyrna Beach.

With two convenient locations, the Wake Up Café offers both traditional American breakfast fare as well as international specialties like alfajores pancakes, an Argentinian dish featuring dulce de leche caramel sandwiched between two buttermilk pancakes and dusted with powdered sugar. It's deliciously decadent.

Over on Flagler Avenue, Third Wave Café serves up brunch in its charming, verdant garden. A variety of crepes, both sweet and savory, are the stars here. Don't forget to try a mimosa or Bloody Mary, the perfect breakfast sidekicks.

More of the grab-and-go type? Stop by Go Juice NSB or the Mason Bar for an acai bowl bursting with color and flavor. Both eateries also offer healthful juices and smoothies, packed with fruits and veggies.

Coffee connoisseurs will want to enjoy a warm cuppa from local favorite, Island Roasters, where you'll find freshly roasted, organic and fair-trade coffees on the board. Warm up with a piping hot café au lait or go the iced route—the baristas use coffee cubes so your beverage still packs a punch after some time in the sun.

The oldest shop in town, Nichols Surf Shop, is another full-service operation offering lessons, rentals, and a surf report. The report provides real-time details on local beaches to find the best surf action. If you are all set to surf and need to find the right beach, several spots offer great surf opportunities: Esther Street Beach, Crawford Road Beach, Clancy Beach Park, Hiles Boulevard, Beachway Beach, Matthews Avenue, and 27th Avenue. Where there are waves, you will see surfers. Grab your board and paddle out to catch the big one!



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ELDORA...ANOTHER PLACE IN TIME

Enjoy a brief stroll through the century old live oaks to the once thriving village of Eldora. Close your eyes as you rock on the porch and imagine the excitement of the arrival of a steamboat, or just absorb a magnificent view of Mosquito Lagoon.

The Eldora State House was built around 1912 on the shore of Mosquito Lagoon and remained in use through the late 1950's. The last family to occupy the house was the Wells' family who vacated the building and moved to Jacksonville in the mid-1950's. In



1989, the non-profit organization Friends of Canaveral, including member T.C. Wilder (head of the steering committee to establish Canaveral National Seashore), started a campaign to raise money to renovate the property. One fundraising event, the Eldora Sampler, was held from the late 1980's until 1997. Finally, the restoration was completed and the Eldora State House "Renovation Completion Celebration" was held on May 22, 1999. The following day the house opened to visitors.

Friends of Canaveral still hold events at the house, including the annual Holiday Open House at Eldora. For more information visit www.friendsofcanaveral.com.







VOLUSIA COUNTY BEACH DRIVING

Driving on the beaches New Smyrna Beach is a Volusia County tradition dating back to the early days of the automobile. For years, beachgoers have enjoyed a leisurely drive on the wide, hard-packed sands. Please be a responsible beach driver by driving only in designated areas and observing the speed limit. The driving areas are designated by signs and wooden posts. Please watch for pedestrians, sunbathers and wildlife. Parking is allowed east, or seaward, of the posts.

The beach is open to vehicles from 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. or sundown whichever is earlier from May 1 through October 31, and between sunrise to sunset from November 1 to April 30, tides permitting. Beachgoers are encouraged to follow Volusia County Beaches on Facebook and Twitter for the latest beach information.




Beach Driving Safety

Please adhere to the following safety rules to ensure a positive, fun and safe experience for all beachgoers:

- Drive carefuly and watch for pedestrians, especially children. **Observe the 10mph speed limit at all times.**
- Drive with your headlights on and front windows down.
- Parking is allowed east (seaward) of the conservation zone. Please park perpendicular to the coastline either facing the ocean or the dunes. Double parking is not permitted.
- Refrain from using your cell phone while driving. **Texting while driving is** strictly prohibited.
- Driving or parking in the conservation zone is prohibited.

PONCE DELEON INLET LIGHTHOUSE



In 1887 this 175 foot tall lighthouse flashed for the first time. Originally the beacon burned oil which was converted to electricity in the 1920's.

203 steps spiral upward to this great lamp which has a revolving lens made in Paris in 1867. The brilliant light beamed out to sea six times every 26 seconds and was visible some 20 miles out.

The lighthouse rests on a 45 foot wide base with a 12 foot foundation of brick. At the base the structure is 32 feet in diameter and tapers upward 175 feet. Also on this property is a sea museum which was once the head lighthouse keeper's house. Four other buildings lend a view of the past as one building has been restored and furnished in the era of 1890.

Today the lighthouse is open to the public from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. lending a breathtaking view of Ponce Inlet, New Smyrna Beach and the surrounding area. The Lighthouse can only be reached by taking U.S. 1 from New Smyrna, crossing the Dunlawton Bridge in Port Orange and traveling south 6 miles to Ponce Inlet.

EXPLORE THE OUTDOORS

New Smyrna Beach Multi-Use Trail

This multi-use trail spans 2.2 miles from West Pine Avenue just north of State Road 44 off Mission Road to Sugar Mill Drive. The 12-foot wide, multi-use trail has been constructed in an existing utility corridor. The eastern trail head is on West Pine Avenue between Jungle Road and Pioneer Trail. The western end is next to Geiger-Glencoe Cemetery on Sugar Mill Drive. Parking is available at both ends.

Indian River Lagoon Park on the Beachside

Featuring a scenic trail throughout the natural settings of the bank of the Indian River Lagoon Park off Sandpiper Avenue. Another section of the park has a nature walking / biking trail, which runs from 27th Avenue to 18th Avenue on the west side of Saxon Drive.

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
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
