





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CHRISTMAS PARK

Christmas Park is situated in the heart of the Canal Street Historic District and is home to the Santa House during the holiday season. It also serves as a stage for entertainment & various activities put on by the Canal Street Historic Association and the City. Located at Corner of Live Oak Street and Canal Street.





LOST LANDMARK THE CORONADO HOTEL

In the early days of the city we now know as New Smyrna Beach, a separate community known as Coronado Beach existed eastward across the river.



The first documented hotel on the oceanfront in Coronado Beach was The Coronado Hotel, which stood on the dunes at the end of present-day Flagler Avenue. Foster Austin completed the construction of the accompanying beach cabins that are described in one of the promotional pieces for the hotel. While the builder of the hotel itself is not known, it is thought that Austin, or some of Austin's partners, could be responsible. It is thought that the hotel also housed Coronado Beach's first postal service center.

In the early 1890s, Francis Sharp, a hotelier from the Atlanta area, purchased the establishment and came with his wife, Julia Sharp, and children to run The Coronado Hotel. Sharp and his family also owned a property behind the hotel which they referred to as Sharp's Lodge at Coronado.







Tragically, The Coronado Hotel burned in 1896. Only Mrs. Sharp and three of the Sharp children were in the hotel at the time and while all escaped safely, the hotel was a total loss. Following the fire, the Sharp family remained in Coronado Beach into the early 1900s and promoted Sharp's Lodge at Coronado to those visiting the area.



The Sharp's oldest son, William A. Sharp, was at that time the Art Professor at Stetson University in Deland. He is credited with the design of the stained-glass windows in Lee Chapel built in 1897, which still stands on Stetson property today. Family lore shares that William would return to The Coronado Hotel each weekend when classes ended at Stetson, traveling by horse and buggy. Following

the Sunday evening meal, William would return to Deland. He reported being able to sleep most of the trip overnight as his horse knew the way back to the Stetson campus. Apparently, the first self-driving transportation was a good horse!

The Sharp family relocated to California following their older son as his career in art developed. By 1908

William A. Sharp, or W.A. Sharp as he became known, was commissioned to create the architectural drawings and stained-glass windows for the Mission Inn, a national historic landmark hotel in Riverside, CA. His artwork continues to draw a following among collectors and shares a glimpse of the early years of Coronado Beach.

NEW SMYRNA MUSEUM OF HISTORY

New Smyrna Beach's unique history is preserved and presented in the New Smyrna Museum of History. Diverse exhibits, unique events, and a gift shop featuring unique locally made gift items & literature create an engaging experience for all ages, visitors & residents alike.

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The Mary S. Harrell Black Heritage Museum is the cornerstone of the Historic West Side Community in New Smyrna Beach, Florida. The museum resides in the old Sacred Heart/St. Rita church building, constructed in 1899.

The museum displays a rich and varied collection of photos, oral histories, and memorabilia that tell the story of the people who live here. The collection educates citizens and students about the history and race relations in small town Florida over the course of the twentieth century. The oral histories and photographs speaks of the hardships and triumphs of this African community from the early 1900's to the present. These personal accounts of daily life make history come alive for young and old.

Mary S. Harrell, founder of the museum, knew the value of preserving history. She once stated "Slavery and discrimination may be ugly,

but the stories of the past, both good and bad, need to be told. I want the children to know that was life then, and if you're not careful, you'll slip right back to it".

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
Located in Riverside Park, the Odyssey Memorial stands twenty-four feet high & was completed in the early 2000's to commemorate the arrival of early settlers to New Smyrna from Greece, Minorca, Italy & Corsica. The Memorial was designed by the Xepapas Design Group, led by the late architect Andy Xepapas of the AHEPA, and painted by the Apostolos Group & Weston Coatings.





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




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- Be aware of rip currents. Rip currents are channels of fast-moving water that can pull even the most experienced swimmers from shore. Learn how to spot a rip current & how to respond if caught in one prior to entering the water.
- Supervise children closely when on the beach. Accompany children when crossing the traffic lanes or swimming & playing in the ocean.
- Keep a safe distance from the traffic lanes and parking areas when setting up personal areas for sitting & sunbathing. Sunbathing is permitted to the east and west of the traffic lanes.
- Watch for dangerous weather conditions.
 If thunder is heard, a lightning strike is possible. Take shelter in a vehicle or leave the beach to seek safety indoors.
- Be courteous to fellow beachgoers.
 Music or noise that can be heard from more than 50 feet of the source is illegal.
- Personal watercraft operators must stay in the proper zones and wear a helmet at all times.
- Alcohol, fireworks, glass containers & pets are not allowed on the beach.
 Service animals are permitted per the ADA.

10 Fun Facts About New Smyrna Beach!

- NSB was the largest attempt of British colonization in the New World. It is known as the second oldest city in Florida and celebrated its 250th birthday in 2018.
- Our excellent surfing conditions have produced more than 8 world-class competitive surfers over the years.
- NSB has the most biologically diverse estuary in North America. It is home to more than 400 species of birds, dolphins, manatees, alligators, turtles, and more.
- There are no chain restaurants on the beachside. Everything is locally owned with only mom-and-pop style restaurants.
- NSB is the "Redfish Capital of the World." Anglers can participate in world-class fishing offshore and in the backwaters of Mosquito Lagoon.

- NSB is one of three locations in Florida where beach driving is allowed. But there are traffic-free zones as well!
- Ponce de Leon Inlet is home to the Ponce de Leon Inlet Lighthouse, which is the tallest lighthouse in Florida and the second tallest masonry lighthouse in the country.
- New Smyrna Beach is set on a barrier island. There is no access to A1A North or South out of New Smyrna Beach.
- Winter, the dolphin known for its prosthetic tail and star of the Hollywood film, Dolphin Tale, was actually found and rescued in the Canaveral National Seashore in NSB.
- NSB is a great location to watch rocket launches from the Kennedy Space Center. Drive down to the southernmost point of the Canaveral National Seashore for an up-close view!

PROTECTING OUR MARINE LIFE

Volusia County's beaches are home to hundreds of unique plant and animal species. Some species, such as the loggerhead sea turtle & the piping plover, are protected by state and federal laws due to being in danger of extinction. Volusia County has taken several steps to conserve the fragile marine ecosystem, such as regulating beach driving and parking. Check out the list below to learn how you can help protect our local marine wildlife!

DON'T disturb any sea turtle nests, markers, or protective screening

DON'T disturb any nesting seabirds, their eggs or nesting areas

DON'T use bright lights at night when on or near the beach

DON'T disturb or interfere with adult or hatchling sea turtles in the water, on the beach, or at their nests

DO use only designated driving lanes, parking areas and beach access boardwalks/walkways

DO flatten sandcastles, fill holes, and remove all items & trash when leaving the beach

DO use only red LED flashlights when on the beach at night

DO observe wildlife from a safe distance - if a animal appears to be injured or in danger, notify the proper authorities


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CANAVERAL NATIONAL SEASHORE

Canaveral National Seashore contains nearly 58,000 acres of barrier island, open lagoon, coastal hammock, pine flatwoods, and offshore waters. With 24 miles of pristine beach, it is prime habitat for many threatened and endangered species and provides nesting beaches for several thousand protected marine turtles. Two thirds of the park is located within Mosquito Lagoon. The lagoon is designated as an estuary of national significance and an outstanding Florida water-way. It is one of the most diverse and productive estuaries in North America. The national seashore also contains cultural resources that reflect human history in the Florida peninsula from 2000 BC to early 20th century Florida settlement. Swimming, sunning, surfing and beachcombing are favorite pastimes on this strip of land that time as left untouched.

Entrances to Canaveral National Seashore in south New Smyrna Beach, Apollo beach district or east of Titusville, Playalinda beach district. There are also many entry points accessible by boat on the lagoon section of the seashore. For current operating hours and fees see www.nps.gov/cana.







NEW SMYRNA SUGAR MILL RUINS

Whether you want a hearty meal of bacon and eggs or something more inventive like chai banana bread French toast, there's a bounty of breakfast options in New Smyrna Beach.

With two convenient locations, the Wake Up Café offers both traditional American breakfast fare as well as international specialties like alfajores pancakes, an Argentinian dish featuring dulce de leche caramel sandwiched between two buttermilk pancakes and dusted with powdered sugar. It's deliciously decadent.

Over on Flagler Avenue, Third Wave Café serves up brunch in its charming, verdant garden. A variety of crepes, both sweet and savory, are the stars here. Don't forget to try a mimosa or Bloody Mary, the perfect breakfast sidekicks.

More of the grab-and-go type? Stop by Go Juice NSB or the Mason Bar for an acai bowl bursting with color and flavor. Both eateries also offer healthful juices and smoothies, packed with fruits and veggies.

Coffee connoisseurs will want to enjoy a warm cuppa from local favorite, Island Roasters, where you'll find freshly roasted, organic and fair-trade coffees on the board. Warm up with a piping hot café au lait or go the iced route—the baristas use coffee cubes so your beverage still packs a punch after some time in the sun.

The oldest shop in town, Nichols Surf Shop, is another full-service operation offering lessons, rentals, and a surf report. The report provides real-time details on local beaches to find the best surf action. If you are all set to surf and need to find the right beach, several spots offer great surf opportunities: Esther Street Beach, Crawford Road Beach, Clancy Beach Park, Hiles Boulevard, Beachway Beach, Matthews Avenue, and 27th Avenue. The Parks Division is part of the Maintenance Operations Department within the City of New Smyrna Beach. The mission is to provide safe, accessible and inviting parks & public spaces where quality of place, service and stewardship meet.

PONCE DE LEON INLET LIGHTHOUSE

In 1887 this 175 foot tall lighthouse flashed for the first time. Originally the beacon burned oil, but was converted to electricity in the 1920's.

203 steps spiral upward to this great lamp which has a revolving lens made in Paris in 1867. The brilliant light beamed out to sea six times every 26 seconds and was visible some 20 miles out.

The lighthouse rests on a 45 foot wide base with a 12 foot foundation of brick. At the base the structure is 32 feet in diameter and tapers upward 175 feet. Also on this property is a sea museum which was once the head lighthouse keeper's house. Four other buildings lend a view of the past as one building has been restored and furnished in the era of 1890.

The Ponce de Leon Lighthouse became a National Historic Landmark in 1972. Today, the lighthouse

operates as a museum, lending both a glimpse into the past and a breathtaking view of Ponce Inlet, New Smyrna Beach and the surrounding area. Tours, both guided and self-guided, are available along with unique activities and events such as the monthly "Climb to the Moon".

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ELDORA...ANOTHER PLACE IN TIME

Enjoy a brief stroll through the century old live oaks to the once thriving village of Eldora. Close your eyes as you rock on the porch and imagine the excitement of the arrival of a steamboat, or just absorb a magnificent view of Mosquito Lagoon.


The Eldora State House was built around 1912 on the shore of Mosquito Lagoon and remained in use through the late 1950's. The last family to occupy the house was the Wells' family who vacated the building and moved to Jacksonville in the



mid-1950's. In 1989, the non-profit organization Friends of Canaveral, including member T.C. Wilder (head of the steering committee to establish Canaveral National Seashore), started a campaign to raise money to renovate the property. One fundraising event, the Eldora Sampler, was held from the late 1980's until 1997. Finally, the restoration was completed and the Eldora State House "Renovation Completion Celebration" was held on May 22, 1999. The following day the house opened to visitors.

Friends of Canaveral still hold events at the house, including the annual Holiday Open House at Eldora. For more information visit www.friendsofcanaveral.com.





VOLUSIA COUNTY BEACH DRIVING

Driving on the beaches New Smyrna Beach is a Volusia County tradition dating back to the early days of the automobile. For years, beachgoers have enjoyed a leisurely drive on the wide, hard-packed sands.

Beach driving access hours are seasonal. From May 1-October 31, access is open from 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. (or sundown if it occurs earlier than 7:00 pm). From November 1 - April 30, access is open from sunrise to sunset. Please keep in mind that access may be temporarily closed during high tide.

- Observe the 10mph speed limit at all times
- · Refrain from using your cell phone while driving texting while driving is strictly prohibited
- · Drive with your headlights on and front windows down
- · Do not drive or park west of the conservation zone boundary posts
- · Park either facing the ocean or the dunes double parking is not permitted



EXPLORE THE OUTDOORS

Lace up your sneakers - or grab your bike or canoe - and immerse yourself in the raw natural beauty that New Smyrna Beach and surrounding areas have to offer.

INDIAN RIVER LAGOON PARK

.6 mile trail along Indian River Lagoon. Canoe/launch with access to miles of waterways for paddling, plus paved roadside walking/biking trail. More information available at www.cityofnsb.org.

SMYRNA DUNES PARK

2.4 miles of trails on a wide, elevated handicapped-accessible boardwalk in 184-acre inlet park. A fee is required to enter the park.

DORIS LEEPER SPRUCE CREEK PRESERVE

17.7 miles of multi-use trails in 2,513 acre preserve. Features 4 canoe launches with access to miles of creek open for paddling, a disc golf course, various picnic areas, and a 15 foot observation tower overlooking the marsh.

LONGLEAF PINE PRESERVE

14.5 miles of multi-use trails in a 12,005 acre preserve offering various natural communities habitats plus opportunities to spot diverse wildlife.
