
New Smyrna's Role in the 2nd Seminole War


Many debate the origin of the ruins in Old Fort Park. Very few talk about the actual Fort that was located here, Fort New Smyrna.

The fort was built in 1836 after the local attacks that destroyed the De Peyster and Cruger sugar mill and other homes in New Smyrna in December 1835.

The fort consisted of four log houses built in a hollow square. Two were for enlisted men, one for officers, and one for a hospital and commissary.



A munitions storage bunker was also located inside the barricade that surrounded the fort. The most unique element were six columns that were incorporated into the barricade which were remnants of the Dunham home that formerly fronted the river.



The Dunham home was built in 1830 and is said to have been the grandest home south of the Potomac River. Six carved stone columns had been brought in to adorn the front of the home. The columns were the only remnants of the structure after it was set ablaze with the rest of New Smyrna in late 1835.

Fort New Smyrna was primarily a supply location and was at times left unattended. It eventually became a staging area for both ground troops, horse mounted Dragoons, (a predecessor to the U.S. Calvary), and stockpiles of materials needed to build forts to the south.

At one point in 1837, 1000 men were assembled at the fort. A supply line consisting of 15 boats was used to move men and materials south into the Mosquito Lagoon and across "the haul over", where Haulover Canal is today. The supply line provided materials to build more forts to

the south. It also provided food and supplies to support the troops and horses used to capture Florida's Native People and force them west on the Trail of Tears.


By 1842 the Second Seminole war had ended, however Fort New Smyrna remained until 1855. Two officers named Andrews and Lytle who were assigned to the fort, convinced the Dunhams to sell them 100 acres. Once the war was over, they subdivided the land and sold smaller parcels that evolved into the neighborhoods south of our south Causeway Bridge. The streets just north and south of the Woman's Club are named after them.


PRESERVING OUR UNIQUE HERITAGE

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SHARING YESTERDAY, PRESERVING TODAY, SHAPING TOMORROW

The Mary S. Harrell Black Heritage Museum is the cornerstone of the Historic West Side Community in New Smyrna Beach, Florida. The museum resides in the old Sacred Heart/St. Rita church building, constructed in 1899.

The museum displays a rich and varied collection of photos, oral histories, and memorabilia that tell the story of the people who live here. The collection educates citizens and students about the history and race relations in small town Florida over the course of the twentieth century. The oral histories and photographs speaks of the hardships and triumphs of this African community from the early 1900's to the present. These personal accounts of daily life make history come alive for young and old.

Mary S. Harrell, founder of the museum, knew the value of preserving history. She once stated "Slavery and discrimination may be ugly, but the stories of the past, both good and bad, need to be told. I want the children to know that was life then, and if you're not careful, you'll slip right back to it".



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
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NEW SMYRNA BEACH AREA MAP








BEACH SAFETY

- Always swim directly in front of a lifeguard & observe beach warning flags posted on lifeguards towers.
- Be aware of rip currents. Rip currents are channels of fast-moving water that can pull even the most experienced swimmers from shore. Learn how to spot a rip current & how to respond if caught in one prior to entering the water.
- Supervise children closely when on the beach. Accompany children when crossing the traffic lanes or swimming & playing in the ocean.
- Keep a safe distance from the traffic lanes and parking areas when setting up personal areas for sunbathing and sitting. Sunbathing is permitted to the east and west of the traffic lanes.
- Watch for dangerous weather conditions. If thunder is heard, a lightning strike is possible. Take shelter in a vehicle or leave the beach to seek safety indoors.
- Be courteous to fellow beachgoers.
 Music or noise that can be heard from more than 50 feet of the source is illegal.
- Personal watercraft operators must stay in the proper zones and wear a helmet at all times.
- Alcohol, fireworks, glass containers & pets are not allowed on the beach.
 Service animals are permitted per the ADA.

- NSB was the largest attempt of British colonization in the New World. It is known as the second oldest city in Florida and celebrated its 250th birthday in 2018.
- Our excellent surf conditions have produced more than 8 world-class competitive surfers over the years.
- NSB has the most biologically diverse estuary in North America. It is home to more than 400 species of birds, dolphins, manatees, alligators, turtles, and more.
- There are no chain restaurants on the beachside. Everything is locally owned with only mom-and-pop style restaurants.
- NSB is the "Redfish Capital of the World." Anglers can participate in world-class fishing offshore and in the backwaters of Mosquito Lagoon.

- NSB is 1 of 3 locations in Florida where beach driving is allowed. But there are traffic-free zones as well!
- Ponce de Leon Inlet is home to the Ponce de Leon Inlet Lighthouse, which is the tallest lighthouse in Florida and the second tallest masonry lighthouse in the country.
- New Smyrna Beach is set on a barrier island. There is no access to A1A North or South out of NSB.
- Winter, the dolphin known for its prosthetic tail and the star of the film, Dolphin Tale, was actually found and rescued in the Canaveral National Seashore in NSB.
- NSB is a great place to watch rocket launches at Kennedy Space Center! Drive down to the southernmost point of the Canaveral National Seashore for an up-close view.

PROTECTING OUR MARINE LIFE

Volusia County's beaches are home to hundreds of unique plant and animal species. Some species, such as the loggerhead sea turtle & the piping plover, are protected by state and federal laws due to being in danger of extinction. Volusia County has taken several steps to conserve the fragile marine ecosystem, such as regulating beach driving and parking. Check out the list below to learn how you can help protect our local marine wildlife!

DON'T disturb any sea turtle nests, markers, or protective screening

DON'T disturb any nesting seabirds, their eggs or nesting areas

DON'T use bright lights at night when on or near the beach at night

DON'T disturb or interfere with adult or hatchling sea turtles in the water, on the beach, or at their nests

- DO only us designated driving lanes, parking areas, beach access boardwalks/walkways
- DO flatten sandcastles, fill holes, and remove all items & trash when leaving the beach
- DO use only red LED flashlights when on the beach at night
- DO observe wildlife from a safe distance if a animal appears to be injured or in danger, notify the proper authorities

Canaveral National Seashore contains nearly 58,000 acres of barrier island, open lagoon, coastal hammock, pine flatwoods, and offshore waters. With 24 miles of pristine beach, it is prime habitat for many threatened and endangered species and provides nesting beaches for several thousand protected marine turtles. Two thirds of the park is located within Mosquito Lagoon. The lagoon is designated as an estuary of national significance and an outstanding Florida waterway. It is one of the most diverse and productive estuaries in North America. The national seashore also contains cultural resources that reflect human history in the Florida peninsula from 2000 BC to early 20th century Florida settlement. Swimming, sunning, surfing, and beachcombing are favorite pastimes on this strip of land that time has left untouched.

Entrances to Canaveral National Seashore are located in south New Smyrna Beach, Apollo Beach District, or east of Titusville, Playalinda Beach District. There are also many entry points accessible by boat on the lagoon section of the seashore. How To Choose The Best

FOODIE VIBES: WHEN FLAVOR MEETS FEVER

It's Friday afternoon and you're already dreaming of where to dine this weekend. Maybe there's a cozy new restaurant down the street you haven't tried yet, an inviting coffee shop promising a little pick-me-up in every sip, or even those rare, melt-in-your-mouth Dubai chocolates everyone's been talking about. The excitement of discovering something delicious is part of what makes food so much fun.

If your first visit isn't perfect, consider giving the place another shot; sometimes a restaurant needs a moment to shine, and you could be the reason it does.

In the wonderful world of food, the real joy lies in discovering what makes you smile—be it a cozy neighborhood café, an innovative chef's tasting menu, or simply a comforting cup of coffee. The journey is just as flavorful as the destination, and every meal is a chance to create a memory, share a moment, or find a new favorite. So stay curious, trust your taste buds, and savor every bite.



SURF'S UP

There are a handful of great places in NSB to catch a wave and plenty of surf shops to get you outfitted for the sport. Check out Jimmy Lane Surf Academy or Red Dog Surf Shop, both full-service shops offering surf lessons for all skill levels. The oldest shop in town, Nichols Surf Shop, is another full-service operation offering surf lessons, rentals, plus a real-time surf report. Popular surf spots include Esther St Beach, Crawford Rd Beach, Clancy Beach Park, Hiles Blvd, Beachway Beach, Matthews Ave, and 27th Ave.



A BIRD'S EYE VIEW

In 1887, the 175 foot tall Ponce de Leon Lighthouse flashed for the first time. Originally the beacon burned oil, but was converted to electricity in the 1920's.

203 steps spiral upward to this great lamp which has a revolving lens made in Paris in 1867. The brilliant light beamed out to sea six times every 26 seconds and was visible some 20 miles out.

The lighthouse rests on a 45 foot wide base with a 12 foot foundation of brick. At the base the structure is 32 feet in diameter and tapers upward 175 feet. Also on this property is a sea museum which was once the head lighthouse keeper's house. Four other buildings lend a view of the past as one building has been restored and furnished in the era of 1890.

The Ponce de Leon Lighthouse became a National Historic Landmark in 1972. Today, the lighthouse operates as a museum, lending both a glimpse into the

past and a breathtaking view of Ponce Inlet, New Smyrna Beach and the surrounding area. Tours, both guided and self-guided, are available along with unique activities and events such as the monthly "Climb to the Moon".

Close your eyes as you rock on the porch and imagine the excitement of the arrival of a steamboat, or just absorb a magnificent sunset over Mosquito Lagoon. Both activities were enjoyed by early residents and visitors alike, along with horseback riding and walks on the beach. Step back in time, relax and experience Eldora.

The Eldora House, built in 1913, experienced its heyday from around 1900 until the late 1930s, and is the last remaining home from the Eldora Community.

Established in 1876, Eldora was originally a farming community, with oranges as the main crop, and was home to a Post Office, Eldora Hotel, Packing House, and a school with 15 students during its peak. However, the combination of devastating freezes and the railroad arriving to the mainland led to the decline of the community. By the early 1900's, the area was transformed into a resort for fishing and beach activities and was at one time a winter home for a wealthy family of northerners.

In the 1950's, The Summerlin Family purchased the Eldora House Hotel, opening a seafood restaurant in the boathouse, which unfortunately was lost to a fire in 1965. Shortly after, the Meiner Family bought the Hotel with plans to remodel it, but decided to sell the property after the creation of Canaveral National Seashore in 1975.

The Hotel was then left abandoned and sadly fell into disrepair. In 1982, T.C. Wilder and a committee were appointed to examine if restoring the Hotel was possible, but their efforts lacked support and funding from the government. Fortunately, another structure on the property, known as the State House, remained salvageable. Thanks to the efforts of the Friends of Canaveral, \$400,000 in donations and grants were raised, and restoration work began in 1989.

After a decade-long project, renovations concluded in 1999, and visitors were welcomed to step into history and learn about this almost forgotten community. The Eldora State House was added to the US National Register of Historic Places on November 21, 2001, and celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2024.

Driving access hours are seasonal. From May 1 - October 31, access is open from 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. (or sundown if it occurs earlier than 7:00pm). From November 1 - April 30, access is open from sunrise to sunset. Please keep in mind that access may be temporarily closed during high tide. The beach is always open and free to pedestrians and bicyclists, dependent on tides.



To help ensure a fun & safe experience for all beachgoers, please adhere to these rules:

- Drive carefully and watch for pedestrians, especially children
- Observe the 10mph speed limit at all times
- Refrain from using your cell phone while driving texting while driving is strictly prohibited
- Drive with your headlights on and front windows down
- Do not drive or park west of the conservation zone boundary posts
- Park either facing the ocean or the dunes double parking is not permitted



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EXPLORE THE OUTDOORS

Lace up your sneakers - or grab your bike or canoe - and immerse yourself in the raw natural beauty that New Smyrna Beach and surrounding areas have to offer.

Indian River Lagoon Park

.6 mile trail along Indian River Lagoon. Canoe/launch with access to miles of waterways for paddling, plus paved roadside walking/biking trail. More information available at www.cityofnsb.org.

Smyrna Dunes Park

2.4 miles of trails on a wide, elevated handicapped-accessible boardwalk in 184-acre inlet park. A fee is required to enter the park.

Doris Leeper Spruce Creek Preserve

17.7 miles of multi-use trails in 2,513 acre preserve. Features 4 canoe launches with access to miles of creek open for paddling, a disc golf course, various picnic areas, and a 15 foot observation tower overlooking the marsh.


Longleaf Pine Preserve

14.5 miles of multi-use trails in a 12,005 acre preserve offering various natural communities habitats plus opportunities to spot diverse wildlife.
